#### **2020: YEAR IN REVIEW** A MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The Museum of Russian Art (TMORA) entered 2020 with a sense of optimism, based on the momentum provided by strong attendance and enthusiastic public participation in TMORA's programs during 2019 that continued into the new year. That optimism was dashed with the sudden advent of Covid-19 and, like most institutions, TMORA closed in late March, by mandate of the state.

During that period of uncertainty, work took place to establish a financial base that would allow the Museum to reopen when the time came. This was crucial, as earned revenue evaporated with the closure and had to be replaced. Fortunately, TMORA's members and supporters demonstrated their commitment to the organization by making generous donations during the spring of 2020. These gifts were complemented by PPP funds and an EIDL loan, both from the federal government.

With these funds in-hand, TMORA reopened with its full 7-day schedule on June 29, shortly after the state closure order was lifted. Covid-19 protocols including masks, social distancing, capacity limitations, hand sanitizers, and Plexiglas shields were put in place for safety, as were special morning hours twice a week for seniors and those who were immunocompromised. Visitors returned immediately, but at less than 50% of the comparable period in 2019.

Those who did visit were treated to the magnificent exhibition *Leaders and the Masses: Mega Paintings from Soviet Ukraine*, which had been partially installed before the Museum closed. This marked the first exhibition of selected works from the 111 paintings of the Jurii Maniichuk and Rose Brady Collection that were given to TMORA at the end of 2019 and start of 2020.

Since on-site programs were not possible, the Museum entered into the world of virtual programming, along with other arts institutions. On August 24, the first virtual offering featured Jonathan Slaght introducing his new book *Owls of the Eastern Ice: A Quest to Find and Save the World's Largest Owl,* which was a rousing success with 424 participants. Slaght recounted his fieldwork adventures in the Primorye region of Russia, and *Owls of the Eastern Ice* went on to become the most honored natural history book of the year.

Numerous exhibition tours, presented by Curator Maria Zavialova, a discussion by William Brumfield of his book *Journeys through the Russian Empire*, and a live tour of the studio of Elena Gubanova and Ivan Govorkov in St. Petersburg, filled out the virtual program schedule for 2020. Unfortunately, the pandemic spiked again in November, and late that month the Museum closed for the remainder of the year, under another state mandate.

One bright spot at that time was the TMORA Shop, which had established on online presence at the end of October. As a result, local shoppers, as well as those from around the country, were able to make their holiday purchases, despite the Museum being closed.

While 2020 was a tumultuous year in many ways, it was anchored by the steadfast staff, who returned from furlough in June to reopen the Museum, and by the Board of Trustees and its Executive Committee, which met frequently during the year to assure that TMORA would survive and flourish, despite the circumstances.

I give all of them, and TMORA's members, my heartfelt thanks for their dedication during this most trying time.



#### **2020 EVENT HIGHLIGHTS**

**January 4-5:** MN Orchestra Principal Cellist Anthony Ross and TMORA Curator of Classical Music Denis Evstuhin performed two consecutive evenings of Russian classical masterpieces to sold-out audiences.

**January 24**: Katherine Goertz, curator of the exhibition *Mystical Imprints: Marc Chagall, Ben-Zion, and Ben Shahn,* gave a lecture on the influential American Jewish art scene of the first half of the 20th century.

**January 29:** Joshua Yaffa, correspondent for *The New Yorker* in Moscow, presented his book *Between Two Fires: Truth, Ambition, and Compromise in Putin's Russia.* 

**February 8-29**: TMORA's folk performance group *Nitka* traveled throughout central Minnesota, performing and teaching four different educational programs focused on song, dance, and storytelling from the Russian tradition.

February 9: The Museum celebrated the opening of Vladimir Dikarev: Poetic Surrealism.

**February 23:** Minnesota Orchestra musicians Natsuki Kumagai, Ben Odhner, Kenneth Freed, and Anthony Ross performed a midday concert in the main gallery featuring works by Borodin, Prokoviev, and Shostakovich.

March 7: The Museum celebrated the opening of *A Parliament of Owls: Children's Art from Russia,* and launched its Russian Language Course program.

**March 8:** International Women's Day was commemorated in the galleries with bouquets of mimosas and TMORA's folk performance group *Nitka*.

**August 4:** Following a three month closure (due to the pandemic), TMORA's first virtual program premiered to an audience of 424 viewers. Award-winning author Jonathan Slaght presented his book, *Owls of the Eastern Ice: The Quest to Find and Save the World's Largest Owl.* 

**September 10:** Award-winning filmmaker Gabe Polsky and professional sports marketer Stephen Warshaw discussed their documentary *Red Penguins* in a riveting virtual panel discussion. The event was presented in partnership with the Russian-American Business & Culture Council, Global Minnesota, Minnesota Committee on Foreign Relations, Minnesota Trade Office, and Zerkalo/Russian Media.

**September 29:** The Museum premiered the successful virtual series, *Virtual Tour with the Curator,* featuring Curator Masha Zavialova and Director of Public Programs Michelle Massey.

**October 21:** Author William Brumfield led a virtual discussion with incredible images from his book *Journeys Through the Russian Empire* with Curator Masha Zavialova.

**November 10:** TMORA partnered with the Russian-American Business & Culture Council, Minnesota Committee on Foreign Relations, Global Minnesota, and Zerkalo/Russian Media in presenting the virtual discussion *The US Election's Impact on Russian Relations*.


