PARKING

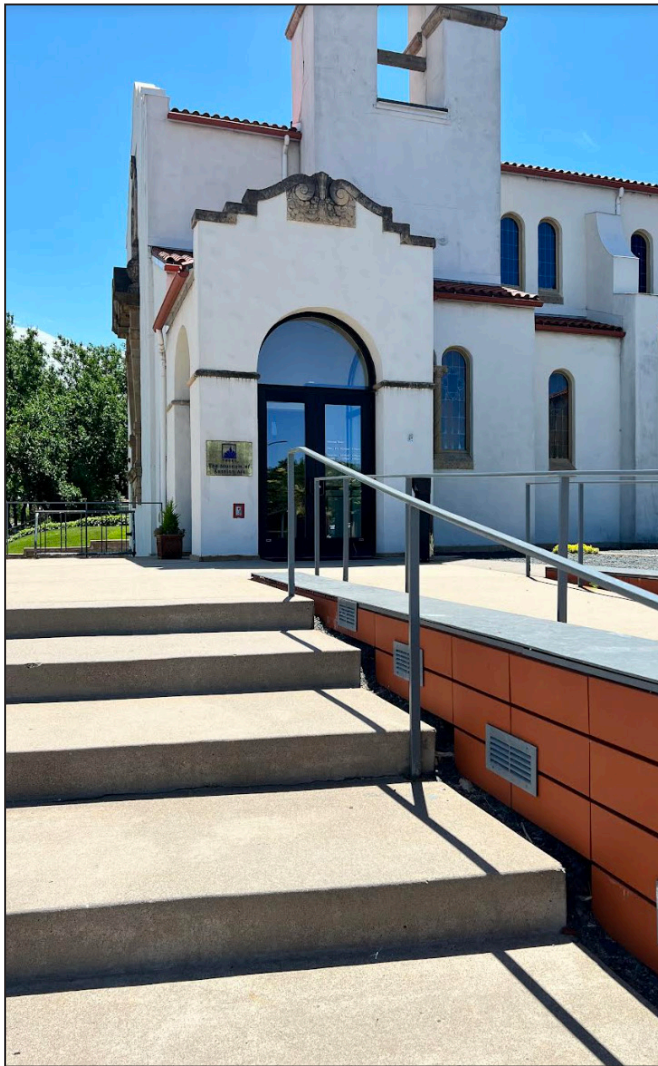
The exhibitions in the museum change approximately every 6 months. The front desk staff member will inform you if one of the galleries is closed while they prepare for the next exhibition.

VISITING THE MUSEUM | Welcome!

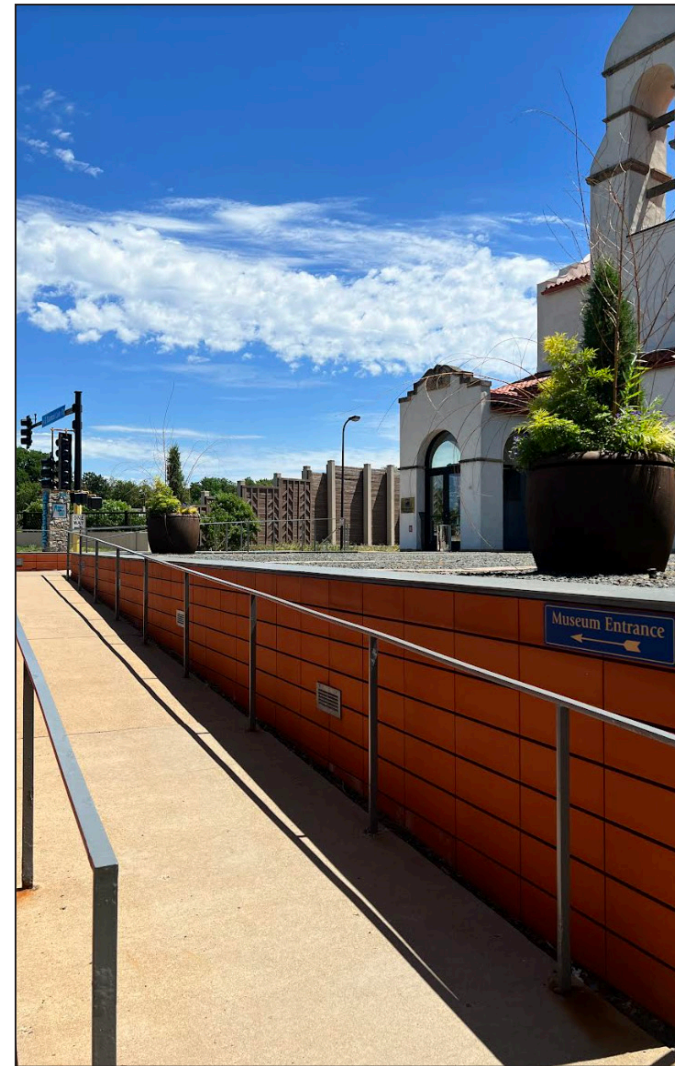


When I arrive at the museum, I can park for free across the street from TMORA.
This parking is shared with a school and church.

I can safely use the controlled crosswalk to get to TMORA.



The main entrance has glass doors. I will go up stairs with the assistance of a hand rail to reach the front doors.



If I am not able to use the stairs, there is also a ramp at the front of the museum.



I will go through two sets of glass doors to reach the lobby of the museum.



When I enter the museum,
there are a few steps to go up in front of
me. I will see the front desk on the left.



When I enter the museum,
there is a wheelchair lift to my right.



I can pay for my admission at the front desk. There will be a friendly front desk staff member there to greet me. She/He/They will tell me the price of admission.

You can pay with a credit/debit card or cash.

I will not receive a physical ticket for my visit.



I have the option to wear a mask in TMORA. There is a box of paper masks for visitors at the front desk.

If I don't see any masks, I will ask the front desk staff member for help.

VISITING THE MUSEUM | Front Desk



After I pay for admission, I can take any of the following to make my visit informative and fun:

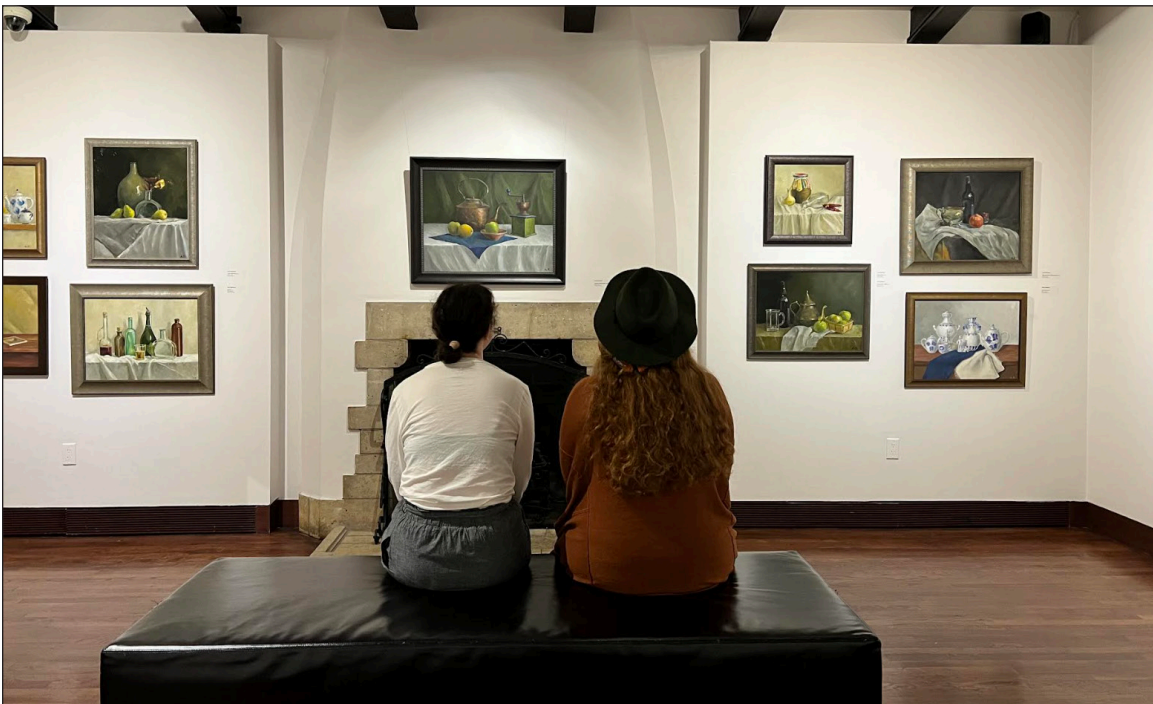
Exhibition pamphlets – these have helpful information about the different exhibitions that are currently on display. These will change as exhibitions change.

Museum Map – this is a helpful tool with symbols to guide me around the museum.

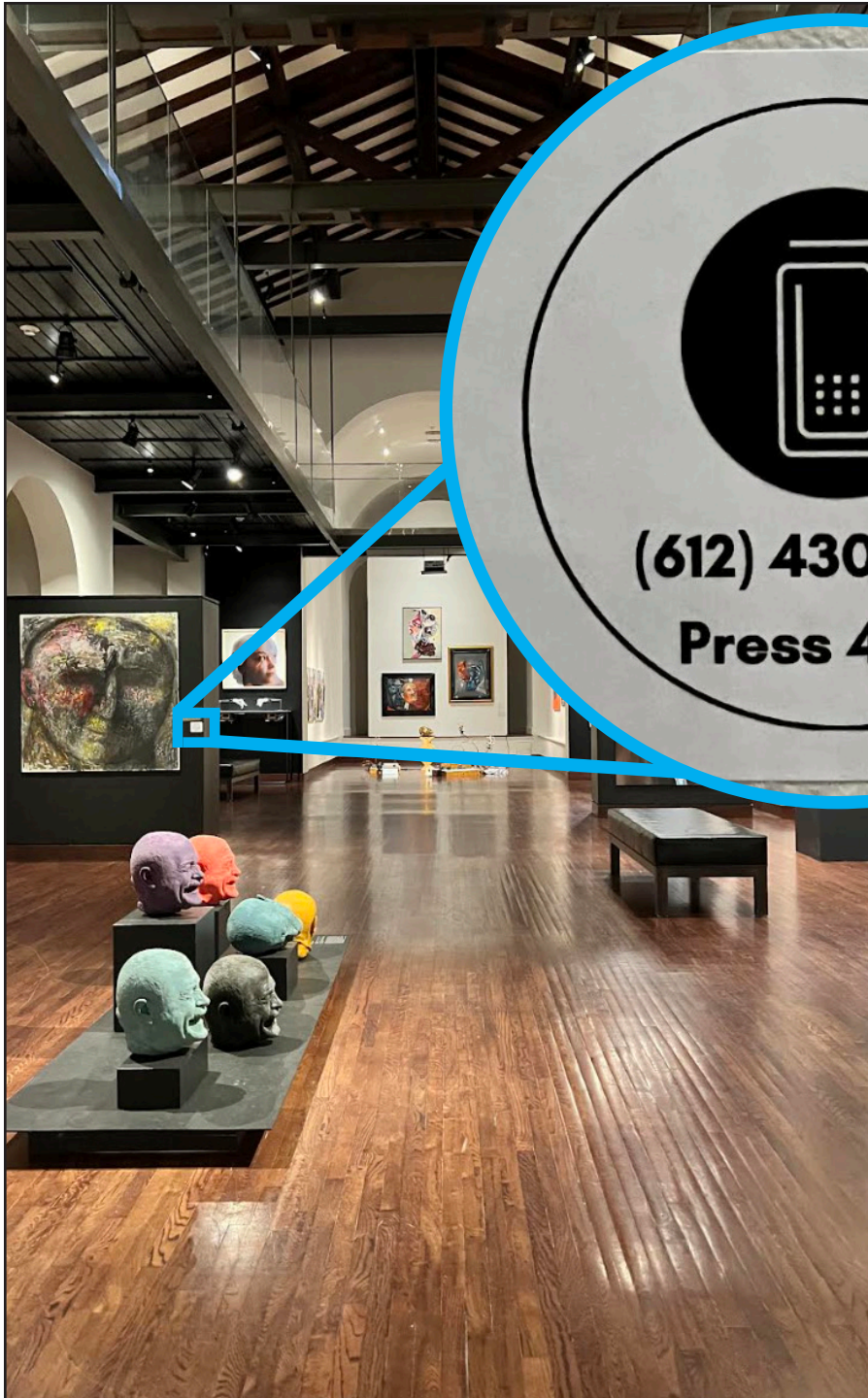
Gallery Hunt – I can do this during my visit. The front desk staff member will give me a clip board and pencil. When I finish the Gallery Hunt, I will go back to the front desk and receive a sticker!

Art is fragile. Throughout my visit at TMORA, I will follow these rules:

- I will keep my hands off of the art. I can keep my hands in my pockets, at my side, or use a fidget when looking at art.
- I will keep two big steps between myself and the art and other people.
- I can take photos of the art without a flash.
- I will not drink or eat in the galleries.



I will see signs that look like this throughout the museum. It is a friendly reminder for me and others that we can't touch the artwork.



I will find this symbol throughout the museum.

This symbol tells me that there is an audio tour stop. This is optional.

Call the number and dial the 3-digit number followed by the # key. After calling once, I can continue dialing 3-digit numbers.



This is the Coat Room. I can hang my coat here for free.

I need to go down the stairs or elevator to the Lower Gallery to use to the Coat Room.



If I need a break or if I need to go to a quieter spot, I can sit on benches in the Lower Gallery, Fireside Gallery, and Mezzanine Gallery.

The staff or the Museum Map will tell me where all the quieter spots are located.



If I need a break or if I need to go to a quieter spot, I can go into the Nurturing Room.

I need to ask the front desk staff member for the key to this room.

When I am done, I will return the key to the front desk.



I can find the restrooms in the back of the Lower Gallery.

I need to go down the stairs or elevator to the Lower Gallery to use the restroom.



This is the restroom. There is a Men's and Women's restroom.

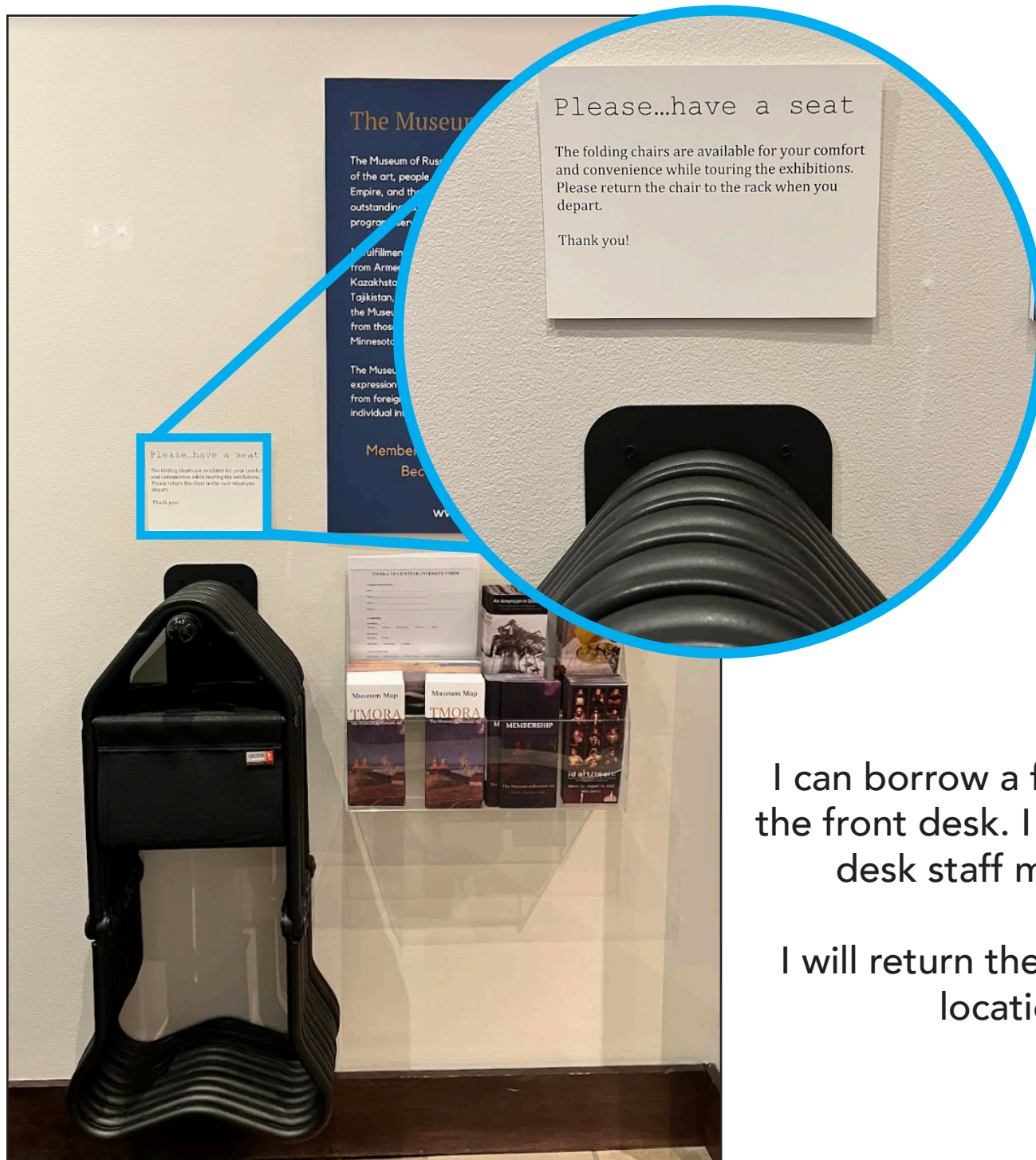
The toilets have a push button to flush the toilet.

The faucets are automatic. They should work when I put my hand in front of the sensors.



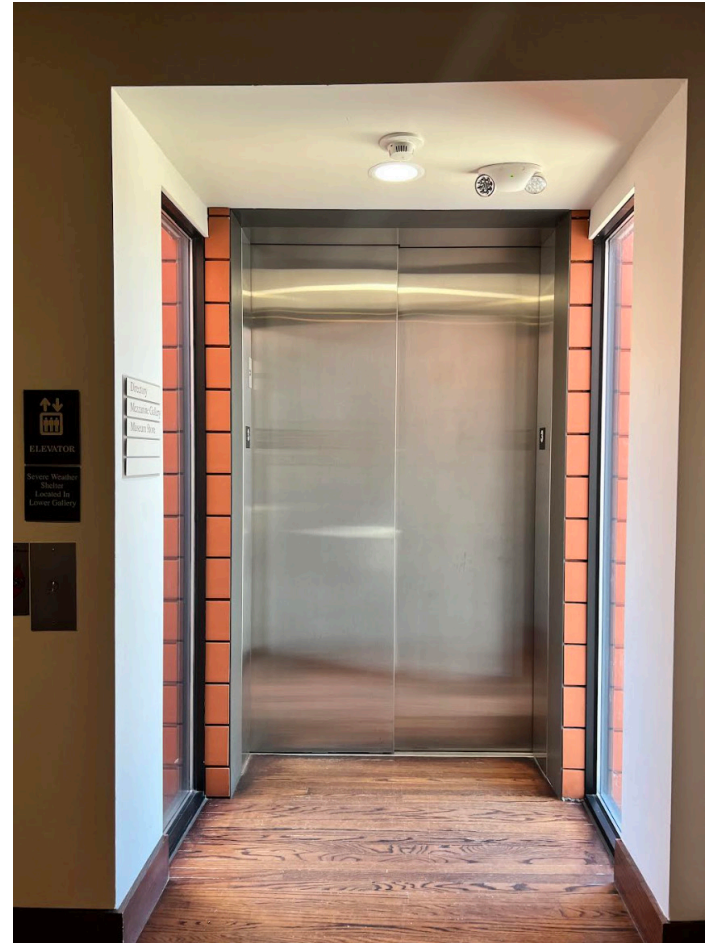
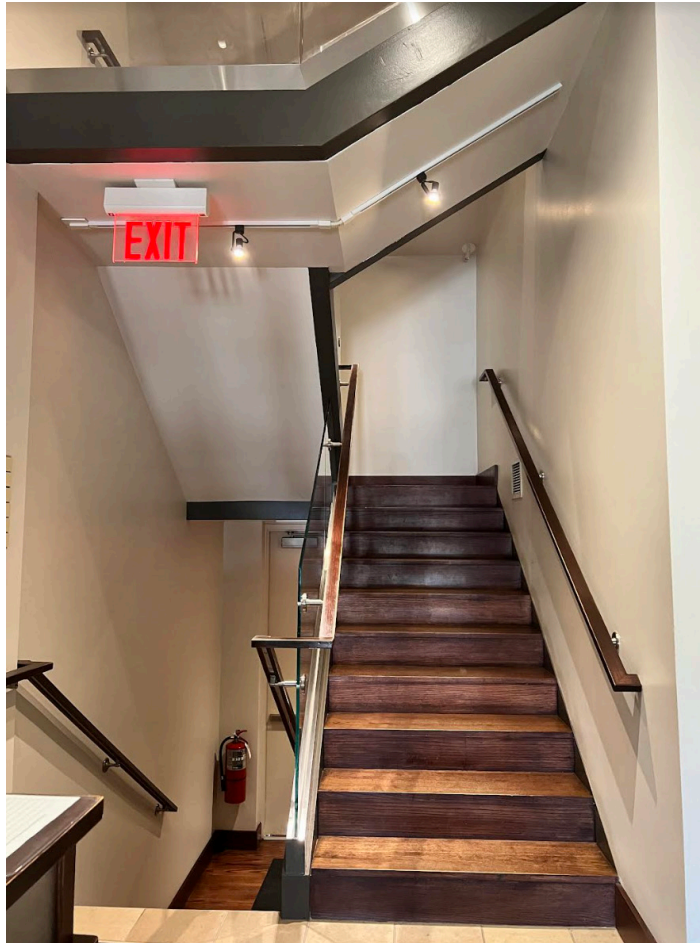
In between the Men's and Women's restroom, I can get a drink of water from the water fountain.

This is the only public water fountain in the museum.



I can borrow a folding chair for my visit at the front desk. I don't need to ask the front desk staff member for permission.

I will return the folding chair to the same location I took it from.



Now it's time to explore the museum!

I can take the stairs or the elevator to access all three levels.



This is the Permanent Collection Gallery. It is also called the Lower Gallery.

This gallery has paintings on the wall and objects in glass cases.



EXPLORING THE GALLERIES | Main Gallery

This is the Main Gallery.

This gallery exhibits paintings, sculptures, and sometimes interactive artworks with sound.

There will be signs to assist if there is an interactive component.

The exhibitions in this gallery rotate approximately every six months.



In the Main Gallery, there is a little gallery off to the side that I can go into.

It is called the Fireside Gallery.



This is the Fireside Gallery. It is a little room off of the Main Gallery.

The exhibitions in this gallery rotate approximately every six months. Sometimes you will see paintings, objects in cases, or videos.



EXPLORING THE GALLERIES | Mezzanine Gallery

This is the Mezzanine Gallery. It is on Floor Three.

The exhibitions in this gallery rotate approximately every six months.

The art that is exhibited in this gallery ranges from paintings, prints, photography, and so much more!



I can go shopping on Floor Three. This is the TMORA Shop.

I can buy food, books, art prints, and many other beautiful gifts here.

I will hear music playing while I shop.



This is where I go to pay for items at TMORA shop.

They will put my items in a bag for me.



When I am ready to leave TMORA, I will return to the front desk.

When I go home, I will share my favorite piece of art that I saw with my family or friends. TMORA is fun to visit!
